



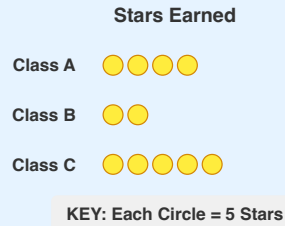

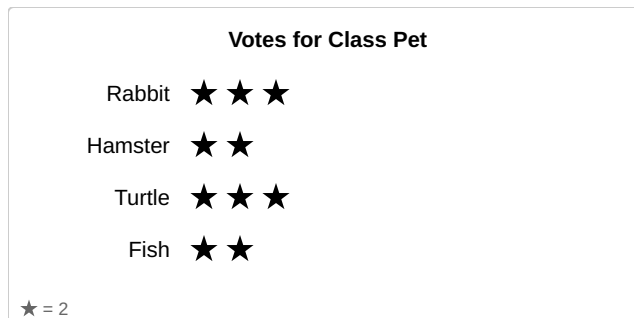
Use the graph and key to answer.

A pictograph uses pictures to show data. The **KEY** tells you how many each picture stands for.



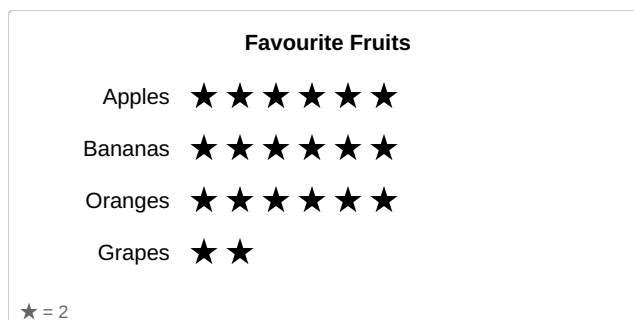
Example: Class A has 4 circles. Each circle = 5 stars, so $4 \times 5 = 20$ stars.

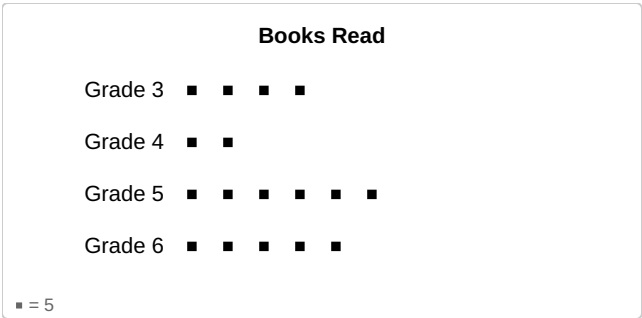
(2) How many students chose "Bananas"?

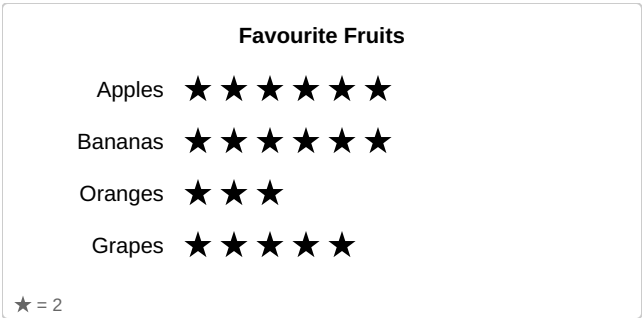

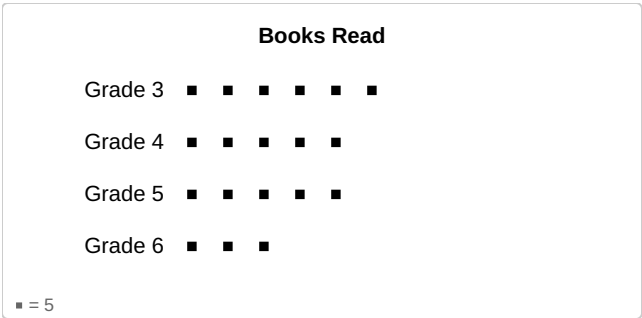

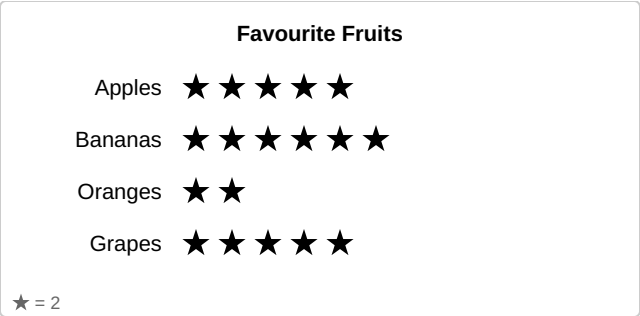
